JOURNEY THROUGH THE YEARS

HIGH SCHOOL HAS CONTRADICTIONS: FAST AND SLOW, EASY AND DIFFICULT, FUN AND STRESSFUL. FRESHMAN YEAR, I HAD ALL THE ANSWERS. AS A SENIOR, I AM BEGINNING TO ASK THE PROPER

QUESTIONS. In middle school, I excelled with little effort. I focused on my passion: golf, and had little inclination to study for tests or complete work beyond the necessary. I thought high school would be the same. I soon realized I was wrong. Luckily, my teachers were eager to help and I took advantage of their office hours. Self-advocacy, a strategy strongly promoted at New Trier, helped me realize that I was not alone in my struggles. Lessons first learned at the Northfield campus became invaluable as I moved on to Winnetka.

At first, the Winnetka campus seemed daunting. Its recently constructed, airport-like "new building" in all its glass glory was intimidating. Its upperclassmen towered over us, and the workload increased exponentially over freshman year. These first impressions were eclipsed by the ease of navigation, the kindness of students, and the interesting new courses. The Winnetka Campus became home: a place where risks could be taken, mistakes made, and growth had.

Junior year—along with its AP classes and college thoughts presented new challenges, to which New Trier prepared me well. Varsity Golf provided an outlet, allowing for individual growth along with team participation. Being captain of the team is one of my greatest honors. Along with it came involvement in a truly formative class: Student-Athlete Leadership Training (SALT). With budding leaders from across New Trier's many sports teams, SALT taught the



importance of building a like-minded community, as opposed to a group of single-minded individuals. Leadership is more about working with one's peers than leading one's followers.

The Post-High School Counseling Department plays a large role during junior and senior years, aiding students with plans after New Trier. For some, senior year means an increase in AP coursework and focus toward college, but other options are available. We all have worked hard to make it this far, becoming intellectually engaged, taking leadership risks, understanding high school culture, growing personally, and engaging with our diverse community. Senior year is about introspection, reflecting on our achievements and pondering the impact these four years will have on the future. It is about asking the right questions.

What Do We Want for Our NT Grads?

What are the characteristics, competencies, skills, and dispositions students should possess to thrive in a rapidly changing world?

n 2016 the World Economic Forum published a report on the future of jobs and skills that noted that by at least one estimate, 65 percent of children entering elementary school today will eventually work in jobs that do not yet exist. This report, along with dozens of others like it, tried to quantify the pace of change and predict the skills necessary to thrive in an unknown future. Thought leaders in education, business, and civics are pursuing the answers to the question posed at the beginning of this article. New Trier, too, hopes to answer this question for its students. New Trier 2030 set a goal to identify and cultivate the Characteristics of a New Trier Graduate that will provide students with the best opportunity to lead meaningful and impactful lives. The profile that emerges from this work will serve as a framework for designing all learning experiences for students.

This year, a representative committee of 31 staff members has been developing the Characteristics of a New Trier Graduate, defining five outcomes or characteristics, such as being creative, critical thinkers or innovative, collaborative problem solvers. Identifying the outcomes the school seeks to develop in each student will provide a clear, strategic vision for the District's priorities and will define the holistic student learning experience. It is the ultimate backwards design plan, aligning teaching and learning, programming and structures, policies and practices to these outcomes.

The committee's next step is to build understanding of the characteristics among staff and community members, parents, and students over the next several months, while also collecting feedback for improving the current version. All New Trier staff engaged with the Characteristics for the first time at February's Institute Day, which

generated great feedback and sparked big ideas for how these Characteristics will enhance the student learning experience. As the committee integrates feedback from stakeholders, a final draft of the Characteristics of a New Trier Graduate will be presented to the Board of Education in April, at which time it will be shared with the schoolwide community of parents and students. We will conclude this year's work by creating an action plan for 2020-2021 to guide each department in aligning curriculum and designing learning experiences that develop each of one of the characteristics.

he New Trier Fine Arts Association asked Fine Arts teachers about how students explore their individuality through the arts. Dance Coordinator Chris Rutt said, "A goal for me as a dance educator is to facilitate students' discovery of themselves. I have a dear friend who speaks of education as an unveiling or as a revealing of one's inner potential." He continued, "In dance, every student has a movement voice. Every walk is as unique as a fingerprint. Dance Division's curriculum is modern-based primarily to allow for exploration of one's creative soul. ... In my classes I also put much thought into building community. Once the students feel safe and valued, they learn to trust. to take creative risk, and to help one another become the best version of themselves."

Alicia Landes, the Art Department Chair, shared, "...[W]e recognize that there are various avenues for students to express their creativity. We believe



in celebrating the uniqueness of each individual by helping students to problem solve, tolerate ambiguity, and navigate the complexities of decision-making with an understanding that there is not a singular solution to every problem, only new problems to solve. The Art Department's aim is for our students to finish high school with the ability and courage to take creative risks, ask better questions in order to solve problems and think through alternatives and improvements. Through this process, students are able to accept failure as part of the learning process while allowing them to pursue their curiosities and inner passions."

All the students share things in common through their New Trier experience. Participating in the Fine Arts at New Trier nurtures the unique creative process of each student. In this way, students are empowered to apply their imagination and unique perspectives to all that life has to offer.
