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Landscape of College admissions

- Impact of COVID in enrolling a freshman and returning class
- Impacted (more popular programs)
 - Computer science/engineering
 - Business
- Class of 2021
 - Overenrolling due to uncertainty of how many students will deposit
 - Impact on housing
- Class of 2022
 - Institutional needs of specific schools
 - More cautious, thoughtful in their admission (yielding to their final number)
 - Shifting in time of admissions decisions (early action to regular decision)



Landscape of College admission

- Class of 2023 – Due to high volume of applications (and limited staff to review) many colleges and universities have deferred or push back notifications to students
 - Where many students in the past received admissions prior to Winter Break, more schools are choosing to evaluate through first semester grades and respond February/March



History of Test Optional

- After a record number of test-takers in 2016, number of students sitting for standardized tests has decreased
- Currently, roughly 3.8% of colleges/universities have SAT/ACT required for admission
- ACT vs SAT?
 - State of IL moved to SAT testing 5 years ago as state assessment



History of Test Optional

- Number of schools adopting a “test optional” policy has increased tremendously in the past few years
 - Initially, many schools decided test optional in order to put more focus on other parts of the student application (holistic, liberal arts)
 - Due to pandemic, many schools adopted test optional due to barriers of sitting for a standardized test
 - With the University of California going test blind in 2022, the desire for institutions across the country to draw applicants from California specifically may impact their use of test scores.



Impact of test optional policies

- Students have the *power* to sit for (and prep) for as many tests as they like, but still apply as test optional if they are not happy with their final score
- Overall middle 50% of scores for many colleges/programs has maintained (or even increased) due to students choosing not to submit scores



Impact of test optional policies (cont'd)

- Initial feedback from schools is that applicant pool/admit pool is equally balanced (for the most part) at colleges/universities
- Increased focus on curriculum and grades earned in chosen curriculum (unweighted grade point average) should students apply as test optional



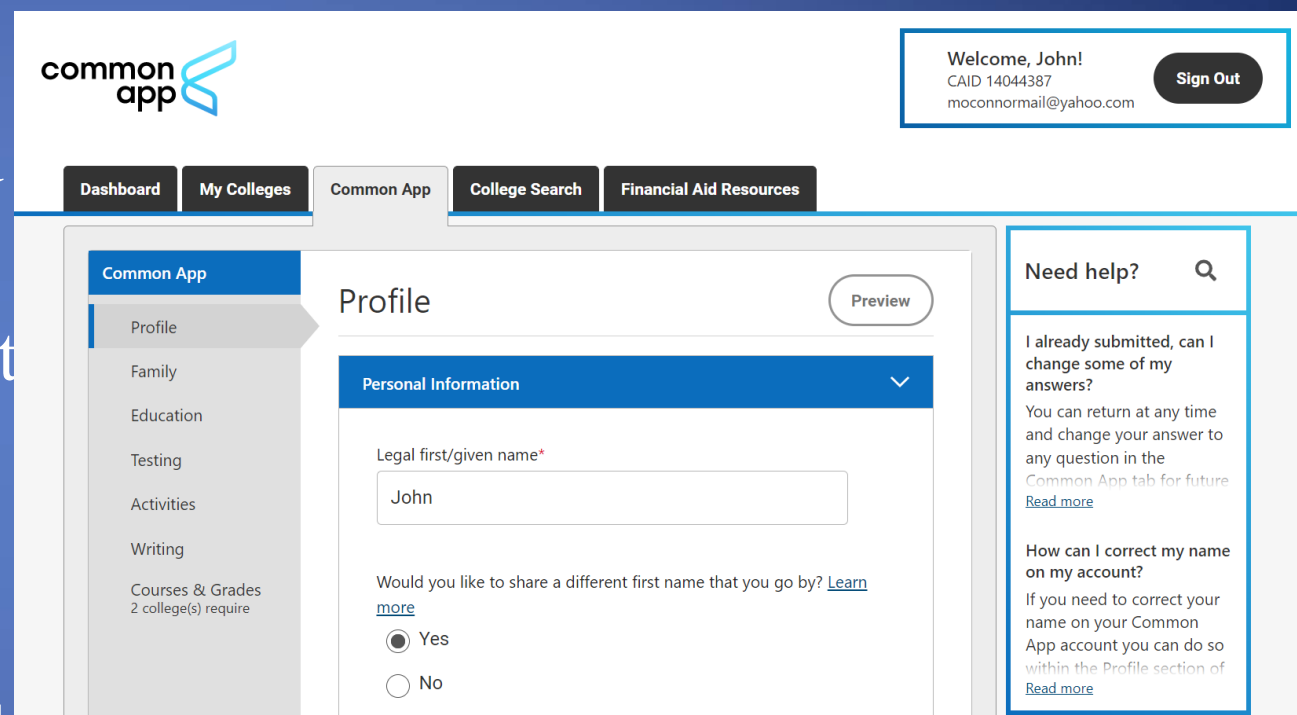
Looking ahead with rising seniors

- Thoughtful research on a variety of options
- College visits to gain firsthand perspective on opportunities available at schools on their list
- Making productive use of the summer
 - PHSC sponsored Workshops and individual meetings with their post-high school counselor
 - Common App Workshops in August (after app goes live for Class of 2024)



Common Application

- One Application portal that is used by over 1000 college and universities
- Students have ability to submit general info to each of their schools
- Supplemental questions and short answers may be required (depending on the school)



Continuing advisor room visits and updates to juniors

- Consider sitting for both ACT and SAT (state-sponsored test in April) to compare their scores
- Securing teacher recommendations prior to end of Junior year
- Schedule initial meeting and follow up meetings as needed
- After May 1, gain insight about decisions for class of 2023 and what admission trends are current (test optional/by major or program/Early Decision use)
- Finish as strong as possible!

- Ideal Opportunity is to see students on campus
