
AP African American Studies Summer Reading 2024

In one of the few stories we have about 18th century fugitive women, Erika Armstrong Dunbar, Professor of History at Rutgers University, brings Ona Judge's perilous journey from slavery to freedom to life. Winner of numerous book awards, it's a compelling story that shows us a northern vision of slavery rarely explored.
