TAKING A LOOK AHEAD...

In order to accomplish this, we want students to embrace the importance of self-awareness, relationship-building (with teachers and peers), value-based decision-making, study habits, academic interests, and extracurricular involvement. Given the adjustments we all made during the pandemic, students are already building resilience and independence, skills that will fortify a successful future.

Unlike most public high schools across the country who employ general school counselors, New Trier post-high school counselors are specialists in their field. We are experts devoted to providing individual, personalized assistance to students navigating their options for life after high school. PHSC IN THE SOPHOMORE YEAR

Post-High School Counselors will be assigned to an advisery during first semester of sophomore year and continue to work in partnership with the groups through graduation. After assignments are announced, advisers will forward a welcome letter from your counselor, who will also begin visiting student adviseries to:

- · Introduce themselves and our Canvas page.
- Discuss the importance of your junior year curriculum and course selection.
- Demonstrate MaiaLearning, our new online data and research resource for navigating a comprehensive post-high school planning process (see details below!).

In second semester, we will host an evening webinar that outlines our department's individualized program of services. Content will include:

- Importance that academics, extracurricular and social development have in the post-high school planning process.
- Preview the junior year timeline for the college search process and admissions basics.
- Cover frequently asked questions on standardized testing.

INTRODUCING: MaiaLearning

The post-high school counseling department is excited to announce we are transitioning to a new, web-based platform called MaiaLearning. Implementation will begin second semester for the Class of 2026. Maia includes a full suite of resources, tools and databases which will provide additional support to students and parents as they navigate the college, career, scholarship and financial aid research and application process. 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STANDARDIZED TESTING

The most frequently asked question we hear from sophomore families is, "When should my student begin taking college admission tests?" The ACT and the SAT are both achievement tests designed for students who are near the *end of the junior year* curriculum, so students are advised to take those tests in the second semester of junior year (February – June). A handful of students who have taken a particularly advanced curriculum may be ready to test in the mid-fall of junior year, but be mindful that taking the exam too early may yield results that undermine a student's confidence, particularly in light of the fact that the test is designed for the end of the junior year. There will be more than enough opportunities for students to take the SAT or ACT during the junior year and even early in the senior year.

Sophomores will take the PSAT 10 on April 10, 2024, which is designed to provide familiarity with the SAT format and identify areas of strength or areas for improvement. During junior year students can elect to take the PSAT/NMSQT test in October. Every April, all Illinois public high school juniors are required to take a state-mandated SAT. With that said, sophomores should not be concerned about or preparing for standardized testing this year.
