I will start with a heartfelt thank you to the entire New Trier Township High School District 203 community for your tremendous support of our high school.


This school year marked a major milestone for New Trier with the opening of the Winnetka Campus Construction and Renovation Project. This community's overwhelming support of the \$89 million bond referendum on the November 2014 ballot was an investment that paid off in the creation of approximately 300,000 square feet of new facilities including 29 new and renovated core academic classrooms, 3 new science labs, a new library and cafeteria, and state-of-the-art spaces for music, speech, theatre, media, art, engineering, and applied arts. My fellow Board of Education members and I were pleased to see the reactions of the more than 1,000 community members who attended our October building dedication and open house. We kept our commitment to the community to deliver the building on schedule, without losing any educational or co-curricular programming and within the financial constraints we outlined at the beginning. We all can agree that this project has exceeded our expectations in promoting innovation, collaboration, access and a feeling of belonging for all students.

As you will read in this Annual Report, that feeling of belonging is reflected in the responses to our annual survey of the previous year's graduates; 98 percent of the Class of 2016 said they had an adult who cared about them at New Trier. We are proud of the academic achievements highlighted in this report, such as the state's highest ACT score for an open enrollment school, and we are also proud of the relationships our students build at New Trier. I encourage you to read some of the quotes from our Alumni Achievement Award recipients in the middle of this report. The value that they gained from their New Trier education is reflected in their lives and careers.

Protecting the value of a New Trier education means protecting our resources, and our financial data at the end of this report shows our commitment to financial stewardship in uncertain financial times. Through careful planning and cost containment, we believe we can present fair, balanced budgets over the next several years.

Our work, however, is not done. This year we will begin a new strategic plan for the District, and we will need input from our community members about the future direction of New Trier High School. While planning is in its early stages, please look out later this year for ways in which you can get involved. Now, as always, the future of New Trier depends on our involved and engaged community.

Our commitment to developing critical thinkers who can explore their own interests and advocate for themselves is as important and relevant now as it was when New Trier was founded in February 1901.

The statistics and boxes on these pages highlight just a few of the many accomplishments of New Trier High School’s most recent graduating class, the Class of 2017. It is worth noting that the academic accomplishments reflect the achievements of the entire class; students who take every level of coursework at New Trier, from college preparatory to high honors, outperform their peers across the country on academic measures such as standardized tests and college benchmarks.

New Trier students also attend a wide variety of colleges and universities across the country, guided by individualized counseling sessions with our eight Post-High School Counselors. New Trier is one of the only public schools in the country with a department specifically devoted to post-secondary planning with individual students, including college, vocation, military, a gap year, and other post-high school experiences.

The Class of 2017 lived New Trier’s motto: “To commit minds to inquiry, hearts to compassion, and lives to the service of humanity.” In addition to the many service opportunities provided through school clubs, the class also participated in several school-wide service learning projects.



As freshmen, the class raised money to provide clean drinking water to a village in India through a partnership with Me to We. During their sophomore year, students learned about a specific area of need in our community and spent a day volunteering with organizations such as Heller Nature Center, New Trier Food Pantry, Maryville Academy, and Misericordia. During junior year, many students participated in the Adopt-A-Family partnership with Northwestern University Settlement House and the Canned Food Drive to benefit the Chicago Food Depository. Building a home with Habitat for Humanity was the primary focus senior year. Seniors held several large fundraisers and made more than 40 visits to the construction site in Lake County to complete the home. An additional 10 percent of funds raised went to build a home in the Philippines.

NEW TRIER: A PLACE TO BELONG

For each of the last six years, New Trier High School has surveyed its most recent graduates about their post-high school experience in the year after graduation. While students report feeling exceptionally prepared for college work, New Trier stands out from other high-performing schools across the country in one important area: relationships built in high school.

Of students surveyed, 98 percent reported they had at least one or more adults who cared about them at New Trier, and 89 percent said they had a trusted adult at New Trier they could go to with a problem. An additional 98 percent reported they had at least one friend who cared about them in high school.

These statistics speak to the efforts New Trier makes to assure our big school feels small—through connections made in the adviser program, the open door policy of teachers, student services for academic and social-emotional support, and the numerous extracurricular opportunities for students who enjoy everything from cooking to improv to intramural competition.

In fact, 86 percent of students in the Class of 2017 participated in at least one extracurricular activity (athletics, intramurals, clubs, or performing arts) at New Trier, and many students were involved in more than one activity at the school. These connections are important as New Trier seeks to make sure our school is one in which every student has a place to belong.

College admissions officers tell our Post-High School Counselors that a New Trier diploma commands respect at schools from coast to coast, giving our students a leg up as they seek to make the perfect match for continuing their studies. Whether at a large university or small liberal arts college, New Trier students find their path with the tools to succeed; more than 90 percent of graduates surveyed a year after graduation say New Trier prepared them well for college writing, critical thinking, and class discussion.

These schools are included because they tend to be larger and thus attract larger numbers of New Trier students. Many students also attend Division II and Division III colleges.

Alumni Achievement Awards 2017



Ann Compton, who grew up in Glencoe and graduated from New Trier in 1965, is the first woman assigned to cover the White House for network television. With 41 years on the air for ABC News, her career spanned seven presidents and ten presidential campaigns. Before retiring in 2014, she anchored and reported from the White House, Capitol Hill, and traveled to all 50 states and six continents on assignment as one of the country's foremost political journalists.



I remember very vividly, a conversation when [my physics teacher] told me 'Mr. Warren, I think you ought to be a professional man.' That ingrained in me the idea that I could be. That made me study hard. . . .

New Trier is a wonderful place. I tell about it all the time, all over the world. I faced a lot of problems in my life after New Trier. I faced a lot of problems in the military. But because I had learned that I could be the best I could be, I confronted these problems wherever they showed up.

LT. COL. JAMES COLLINS WARREN

Alumni Achievement Awards 2012



The late Lt. Col. James Collins Warren graduated from New Trier in 1942. The following year, he enlisted in the Army Air Forces and entered preflight training with the Tuskegee Airmen, an all-black Air Force unit that fought in World War II, and the first black aviators in the U.S. military. Warren served with the 477th Bombardment Group and would go on to serve 35 years in the Air Force with a flying career of more than 12,000 hours.

She has also sold nearly three million records worldwide and has been nominated for two Grammys.

New Trier Anew:

Completed Winnetka Campus Project Offers Exciting New Opportunities for Teaching, Learning



ON OCTOBER 15, 2017, MORE THAN 1,000 COMMUNITY MEMBERS CAME TO NEW TRIER HIGH SCHOOL'S WINNETKA CAMPUS FOR NEW TRIER ANEW, A CELEBRATION AND OPEN HOUSE TO THANK COMMUNITY MEMBERS FOR THEIR SUPPORT OF OUR TWO-YEAR CONSTRUCTION PROJECT.

New Trier Anew capped a process that began in 2014, when Township residents approved the issuance of \$89 million in bonds to fund a new addition, replacing three aging, inefficient and inaccessible buildings on the west side of the campus. Crews broke ground in June 2015 and completed the addition in two phases.

Phase One opened to students in the 2016-2017 school year and included the first new core academic classrooms constructed on the campus since 1957, along with a new student cafeteria, library, green roof, culinary lab, and Applied Arts and Art classrooms.

Phase Two, which opened to students at the beginning of the current school year, includes three new science labs, additional academic and extra-large interdisciplinary classrooms, AV/multimedia labs, a TV and radio station, and music rehearsal spaces and practice rooms. The building also has two new theatres and a new art gallery. In total, the Winnetka Campus gained 29 new and renovated core academic classrooms through the project.

Thanks to the fundraising efforts of the Raise the Stage campaign, New Trier's Tri-Ship and Girls' Club, and the New Trier Educational Foundation, the District was able to fully finish and outfit the new Hayes-McCausland Theatre and two green roofs. Raise the Stage raised more than \$1.2 million in donations for the theatre, named after Mary Catherine Hayes '10 and Sarah McCausland '13, passionate participants in New Trier's performing arts programs. Tri-Ship and Girls' Club contributed \$100,000 for the first green roof, and the Educational Foundation donated \$100,000 for the second green roof.



A central feature of the entire addition is a bright, skylit concourse that connects the new West Building to the existing North Building, Tower Building, and Gaffney Auditorium. Two new elevators enhance accessibility to the campus for people with disabilities. The District is on course to achieve LEED Gold Certification for the entire new addition, which was designed with energy efficiency and sustainability in mind.

Students and staff have responded enthusiastically to the new spaces, reporting more collaboration in and out of classrooms, better integration of technology, a more welcoming feeling for students throughout the building, and better ability for teachers to give students one-on-one support during class time.

New Trier is in the process of reviewing the rest of its facilities on both campuses to identify needs and opportunities in the next 20 years. This summer, the school will build six new tennis courts on the

Northfield Campus, thanks to a generous donation from a private foundation, as well as complete improvements at the Northfield stadium that include a new concessions and restroom building. Thanks to our community members, we are New Trier Anew.



District 203 Budget

Protecting Your Investment through Planning, Strong Management

Throughout the pages of this Annual Report, you will find strong evidence of the value of a New Trier education – through our strong academic performance, individualized programs for students, and impact on some of our most accomplished alumni. We recognize that value comes only through the investment of our taxpayers in our school. It is our obligation to protect that investment through strong fiscal management. For the 2017-18 school year, the District continues to operate under a balanced budget, earning recognition from national financial organizations for its fiscal stewardship.

New Trier’s tax levy is governed by Property Tax Limit Extension Law (PTELL), which limits the increase in the amount of taxes the District can collect from Township residents. After several years of historically low CPI increases, the levy for operating funds increased 0.7% for the 2016 levy (taxes collected in 2017) and will increase 2.1% for the 2017 levy (taxes collected in 2018). Although the assessed value of property in the District may rise this year, the amount of total taxes collected by the District will not increase in excess of PTELL limits.

New Trier receives the vast majority of its funds, 96 percent, from local sources, with more than 91 percent coming from local property taxes. In 2004, the District passed an operating tax rate referendum and committed to the community that a further rate referendum would not be needed for at least five years. That commitment has now been extended 14 years.

Each year, the District works to carefully balance its budget to meet the needs of our students with our available resources. As the chart below illustrates, the District’s 5-year Financial Projections show deficits in future years. It is expected that these deficits can be closed through continued watchful fiscal management, and the District will be able to present a balanced budget for each of the coming years.

The District and its Finance Committee analyze fiscal trends and five-year projections to plan not just the next District budget, but to protect District resources well into the future. Some examples of the District’s ongoing financial stewardship include:

- Last year, the District paid down \$2.3M in unfunded pension liability for employees who participate in the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (non-teaching employees). This saved the District approximately \$200,000 annually in interest costs.
- In the past two years, the District has worked to restructure retirement benefits for some employees to reduce the practice known as “pension spiking” where salaries are increased prior to retirement. Teachers who entered public education after 2011 and District administrators now receive contributions to 401k-style (403b) accounts in lieu of the retirement increases.
- Through ongoing cost containment efforts, the District has saved \$500,000 in areas such as purchased services, supplies and materials, and energy.
- The District works diligently to maintain appropriate staffing levels, and over the past three years has lowered the total number of both faculty and support staff by over ten positions each.
- Independent credit rating agencies reaffirmed the District’s top AAA/Aaa bond rating in January 2018. Moody’s Investors Service cited the District’s “very healthy financial position and strong fiscal management” as reasons it was confident in the top rating, which allows the District to borrow at a lower rate.

One of the largest investments our taxpayers made in New Trier in recent years was through voters’ support of a 2014 referendum to issue \$89 million in bonds to support the Winnetka Campus Project. At the time of the referendum, the District committed to issuing debt that would total approximately \$250 a year on a

\$15,000 tax bill. Due to the District's Aaa credit rating and competitive process for issuing the debt, the actual cost is approximately \$226 a year for the 20 years of the bond, which represents a 9 percent reduction in the amount estimated at the time of the referendum. Through continual review with our construction management company, the final budget came within 1 percent of the budget approved by the Board of Education at the beginning of the project.

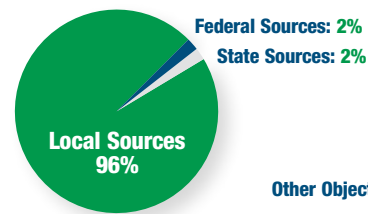

DONATIONS

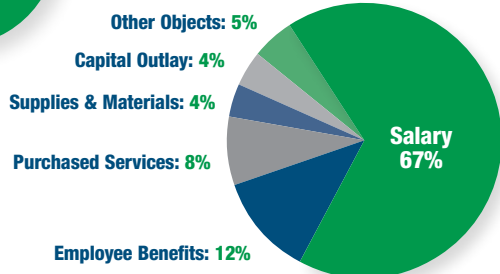
Over the past year, the District has partnered with the community to provide generous support to upgrade our facilities and for programs we offer students:

- The Raise the Stage Campaign raised over \$1.2M to construct and equip the Hayes-McCausland Theater, which is part of the Winnetka Campus Project.
- Two of New Trier's oldest student clubs, Tri-Ship and Girls' Club, raised \$100,000 to build a green roof on Phase One of the Winnetka Campus Project.
- The New Trier Educational Foundation raised \$100,000 to build a green roof on Phase Two of the Winnetka Campus Project.
- The Estate of Corlies Maynard, a New Trier graduate, donated over \$600,000 to the school District's Scholarship Trust Fund, which will endow new scholarships for students studying Social Studies in college.
- A generous \$1.2M donation from a private foundation will allow for the construction of six new tennis courts at the Northfield Campus, bringing the total to 14 courts.

Note: \$3.4M transferred to other funds for capital projects and debt payments. The District's Operating Budget includes all Operating Funds, which represent the vast majority of the District's overall budget. The District also maintains non-operating funds, including Debt Services, Capital Projects, and Fire Prevention and Safety.

FINANCIAL RECOGNITION FOR DISTRICT 203

District 203 is committed to transparency and the highest standards of financial management. These independent organizations have recognized the District for its outstanding work on budgeting and financial reporting:

- **Aaa/AAA bond rating:** New Trier was one of the first school Districts in Illinois to achieve the top rating of Aaa from Moody's Investors Service, meaning the credit rating agency deems District 203 extremely creditworthy and any investment in the District low-risk. Moody's reaffirmed this rating in January 2018. In addition, New Trier received the top rating of AAA from Standard and Poor's credit rating agency in 2015.
- **Illinois State Board of Education Financial Recognition:** District 203 has received ISBE's highest Financial Profile designation for 14 consecutive years
