Students should feel secure in their physical, emotional, and social well-being in order to be fully engaged in their academic, personal, and social growth. New Trier High School is a complex organization that requires the continuous development of courageous, innovative, committed, and exemplary leadership at all levels and from all constituencies, student and adult. The quality of leadership and the climate fostered by leaders have a direct impact and influence on all facets of our school community and beyond.



Community Engagement, Partnerships, and Governance

New Trier High School is a crucial part of the fabric of New Trier Township, serving as a reflection of our community's strong commitment to inquiry, compassion, service, and leadership. The school district and its engaged and informed community of taxpayers, parents, students, alumni, and staff collectively benefit by working in partnership toward common goals.



Finance, Facilities, and Human Resources

To serve the needs of students in their academic and extracurricular pursuits, New Trier High School depends on the financial commitment made by taxpayers to deliver a high-quality education marked by exceptional teaching and facilities. The District supports the school's mission and vision while acting as a responsible financial steward by developing budgets, facilities, and staffing plans that respect the community's investment.





As New Trier planned for a third school year impacted by COVID-19, one goal was clear: keep school safe and open for full in-person learning and extracurricular activities. Thanks to the efforts of staff, students, and families and the flexibility of teachers, coaches, and leaders, New Trier was able to stay open when other schools had temporary closures and to offer a full

array of extracurricular opportunities and athletics.

A Return to the Classroom

New Trier students returned to full in-person learning in August. The school's high vaccination rates (92% of students and 93% of staff) meant many activities that had been restricted in the prior school year could resume - including athletics, intramural sports, clubs, and classroom activities like group work, full music

rehearsals, and handson activities.

New Trier adopted a block schedule in which classes meet every other day for longer periods rather than having every period meet every day. This has helped most students better balance their homework load and

allowed for deeper discussions and longer activities in class. The school surveyed students, staff, and parents and will continue

to operate on a block schedule next year with adjustments to address feedback about the current schedule.

Spreading the New Trier Spirit

The beginning of the 2021 school year also marked a return to

more traditional ways of showing New Trier spirit - starting with the first-day Freshman Welcome Rally at the Northfield Campus stadium, a new Homecoming Night Rally for all students, and the return of the Homecoming Dance. Although a few adjustments had to be made to keep safe during

COVID, such as splitting the dance into two sessions and wearing masks indoors, students responded enthusiastically to the return of these traditions.



IHSA sports returned to their normal schedules, and New Trier was ready to dominate. Trevians took home numerous regional, sectional, and state series honors along with state championships in Field Hockey and Girls Swimming and Diving. Academic teams also were on a roll, including in debate, chess, and Science Olympiad. Meanwhile, theatre, dance, and music students were

back on stage wowing audiences, including at the cherished Winter Music Festival.





Profile of the Class of 2021: Resilience, Excellence Amid Challenges

New Trier's Class of 2021 spent almost half of their junior year and all of senior year learning under evolving COVID guidance. They learned in-person, in a hybrid setting, and remotely during their high school career. Despite these challenges, the vast majority of the Class of 2021 planned to attend college immediately after graduation, enrolling in 227 different colleges and universities. They took advantage of New Trier's vast array of curricular and extracurricular offerings and pursued their passions regardless of the circumstances.

Graduation in an Iconic Setting

As COVID guidance evolved throughout the year, New Trier worked diligently to find a place where the Class of 2021 could gather safely as a class for Commencement. That place turned out to be Soldier Field, home of the Chicago Bears. The city made the stadium available for this one-time-only opportunity so students from across the city and suburbs could gather in their own graduation ceremonies.

New Trier's ceremony took place under a clear blue sky and bright sun, with families in the stands and students sitting on the field. Alumni speaker Liz Phair, Class of 1985, appeared virtually, while student speaker Zara Anwar addressed her classmates in person before they crossed the stage to receive their diplomas.

Prom on the North Lawn

After turning to a virtual format in 2020, New Trier's Prom returned for seniors in 2021. COVID prevented the traditional indoor dance at a Chicago hotel, so New Trier brought a Carnivale theme to seniors right on the North lawn of the Winnetka Campus. Students dressed up, danced, and watched carnival performers in a safe and fun environment.

Open House and Commemoration Event



Academic and Athletic Project



In February 2021, the New Trier Board of Education approved a plan to renovate and replace aging buildings on the East Side of the Winnetka Campus with new athletic and academic spaces that will expand student opportunities for generations to come without the need for a referendum.

The \$79.5 million project, funded by existing resources, will replace the 1928 Gates Gymnasium and 1925 Boiler Plant with a new multipurpose facility within the boundaries of Essex Road and Trevian Way. The project broke ground in January 2022 and is scheduled to be completed by the opening of the 2023-2024 school year.

The project will maintain the same amount of parking at the Winnetka Campus and a design aesthetic consistent with the rest of the campus. The full Athletic and Kinetic Wellness program will continue to be offered during construction.

The majority of the project is being funded by alternate revenue bond proceeds with annual debt service payments of approximately \$2.9 million from existing District revenue

sources. The District also will use \$14.5 million from bond proceeds through the debt service extension base portion of the existing tax levy and \$14.5 million from district reserves.

Highlights of the project include:

- 12 new classroom spaces
- New Competition, Auxiliary Gyms and Indoor Track
- New Weight and Strength/Conditioning Facilities
- New Climbing Wall and High Ropes Course
- Improved Security and Accessibility
- Improved Maintenance and Energy Efficiency
- Recycled Materials and LEED Certification




New Trier Launches Student-Run One Stop Trev Shop

and Career Services Coordinator Melissa Duffy says One Stop Trev Shop hopes to continue developing community partnerships and more collaborations with a variety of classes, activities, and New Trier students to expand the store's inventory into a very "student-driven and creative space." In October, the shop collaborated with New Trier's Green Team to host a PINK OUT game for breast cancer awareness. After selling all 500 t-shirts,

New Trier launched a new on-site store on April 28 that offers they were able to donate \$1,000 to the Northwestern Lake Forest Oncology Program, which was used to provide transportation





for patients to their cancer treatments, massages, and cold cap therapy to help patients keep their hair during chemotherapy.

In addition to retail space, One Stop Trev Shop also houses the 266 Designs production studio, where students produce the majority of custom apparel and drinkware in-house. 266 Designs is a classroom business based out of the New Trier Transition program that Services enables students ages 18-21 to practice a variety of

life, social, and job skills by taking orders, making and folding items, creating invoices, making deliveries, and more. 266 Designs was established

Investing in Our Students:

How Your Tax Dollars Support New Trier Township High School District 203

Throughout the 2020-21 school year, the District focused on providing a safe educational environment as we delivered our robust academic, student services, and extracurricular program for our students. The District's budget is largely funded by local property tax dollars and supported education during a hybrid format for much of the 2020-2021 school year, with a mix of inperson and remote instruction. New Trier is proud to continue our history of strong fiscal management, investing your tax dollars to support our students and the community.

The budget was balanced on a consolidated basis with an operating surplus, enabling the District to reserve for expected capital requirements. The District was recognized for its

financial transparency and strong budgeting principles for the 18th consecutive year by both the Government Finance Officers Association and the Association of School Business Officials. This recognition shows the District has met the highest standards in financial reporting practices and demonstrates its commitment to fiscal responsibility and good governance. The Board, administration, and staff continue to find ways to maintain expense growth in line with District revenues to avoid deficit spending or operating referenda. The District was able to realize a larger than anticipated operating surplus totaling \$6.8 million, which allows the District to continue to maintain the highest possible bond rating and to invest in our facilities.

Your Property Tax Dollar

Property taxes accounted for 90% of the District's \$117M operating revenues during the 2020-2021 school year and are a stable revenue source.

*These calculations are a weighted average for all villages serving New Trier High School; individual percentages will vary slightly from village to village.

On a \$15,000 property tax payment, \$3,900 goes directly to New Trier



Continued Strong Financial Management During COVID-19

The District has responsibly managed its finances during the COVID pandemic, by aligning them to support the safety of students and staff through the purchase of PPE, enhanced cleaning, and changes to ventilation systems. The District has also invested in resources to enhance student learning, such as assessment tools to identify areas of growth and staff to support student learning loss. The District applied for and received federal grants for many of these expenses.


Transforming Our Campuses to Meet Modern Educational, Safety, and Environmental Standards


This year, the District continued to invest in New Trier's campuses through the 15-Year Facilities Plan, which seeks to improve and maintain District facilities with a focus on several areas, including academics, extracurriculars, maintenance, energy efficiency, and security. The plan uses resources provided by taxpayers, including surpluses from prior fiscal years, allocations for the annual budget, and debt from the Debt Service Extension Base, which is a tax-capped funding mechanism in the annual tax levy.

During the summer of 2021, the District invested in its second set of improvements under this plan, completing the renovation of the 3rd floor of the antiquated North (1932) and Tower (1954) Buildings at the Winnetka Campus, modernizing 45,000 sq ft of space that includes classrooms, hallways, and mechanical systems so that these spaces can best serve the needs of students this year and in the future, and have the same functionality and

appearance as the addition on the west side of the campus. The Northfield Campus Library has also been remodeled through this plan, and several roof and mechanical upgrades were completed at both campuses. Other improvements include important security and mechanical upgrades at both campuses.

Even with these improvements, significant work remains in the 15-Year Plan at both campuses. Over 100,000 sq ft of space remains to be remodeled at the Winnetka Campus in the North and Tower Buildings. Thousands of our students continue to use over 20 antiquated, small classrooms built 65 to 90 years ago that do not meet modern standards. An additional 20 science labs need to be renovated at the campus, as well as other important instructional spaces and extracurricular spaces, such as our main pool, built in the 1930s. Improvements must also be made to best serve our students with special needs. The District will continue to work to align our resources to support this work.





*In addition to paying operating expenses, a portion of the District's operating revenues were designated to other funds, primarily for capital construction needs identified in the District's 15year facilities plan and to pay debt service.

Top 5 Budget Takeaways

- New Trier's operating budget was balanced, meeting the needs of our students and providing for additional funds to invest in capital improvements.
- The District continues to maintain and enhance its facilities for the benefit of students, with improvements focused on teaching and learning, the extracurricular program, and energy efficiency utilizing the resources provided by our taxpayers, without seeking property tax increases beyond typical inflationary adjustments.
- The District practices fiscal responsibility, meeting the needs of students through available resources. The District has not sought an operating rate referendum in 19 years and does not project the need for one in the near future.
- The District maintains an Aaa bond rating (the highest rating possible), which allows it to invest in the future and issue bonds for capital investments at lower interest rates.
- The District responsibly managed the financial aspects of the COVID-19 crisis, focusing resources on student and staff safety and reducing expenses where possible.
