SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY

New Trier Township High School District 203 is a comprehensive four-year high school in Northfield and Winnetka, Illinois, located along the Lake Michigan shore, approximately 16 miles north of Chicago. New Trier serves Chicago’s North Shore suburban communities of Glencoe, Kenilworth, Northfield, Wilmette, Winnetka, and portions of Glenview and Northbrook, communities that reflect a tradition of support for academic and cultural achievement. Freshmen are housed on the Northfield Campus; sophomores, juniors, and seniors are housed on the Winnetka Campus.

Governed by its own Board of Education, the district serves six sender public school districts (kindergarten through eighth grade), each with its own governing board. Local private and parochial schools also graduate students who advance to New Trier High School.

EXTRACURRICULAR OPPORTUNITIES

As evidence of the New Trier motto, “to commit minds to inquiry, hearts to compassion, and lives to the service of humanity;” New Trier offers numerous opportunities for learning and involvement outside of the classroom in activities, athletics, fine and performing arts, and social service through:

- More than 150 clubs and other student activities, including an extensive social service component;
- 35 interscholastic sports (winning more athletic state championships than any high school in Illinois interscholastic history) as well as an extensive intramural program; and
- Fine and performing arts programs, including a Grammy-award winning music department.

GUIDANCE

New Trier’s nationally recognized student-advisement system provides a small-school atmosphere within a large school of outstanding opportunities. More than 40% of the faculty serve as advisers, meeting with the same group of approximately 25 students every day for 25 minutes. Advisers provide academic and personal guid-



ance to students throughout their high school years. They also serve as the primary contact for parents. In addition, eight post-high school counselors help students plan for higher education and other alternatives after New Trier.

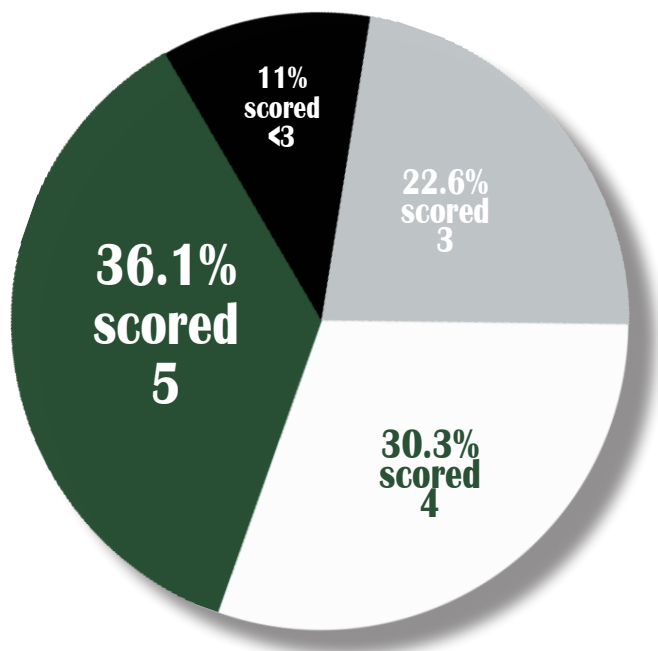
COLLEGE ATTENDANCE RATE

Approximately 96% of New Trier’s Class of 2023 enrolled in college. Of the Class of 2023, 93% enrolled in four-year bachelor degree programs and 3% enrolled in two-year associate degree programs.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT EXAMINATIONS

1002 students took 2,616 Advanced Placement Exams in spring 2023. The average score was 3.9.

New Trier does not allow freshmen and sophomores to take AP classes, and enrollment in AP courses for juniors and seniors is restricted. The most rigorous academic programs typically include five to ten AP courses.

- The 337 students who took 3-level English in twelfth grade, never having taken an AP English class, averaged 26.6 on the English portion of the ACT, with 31.5% of these students scoring in the top 10% of the nation.
- The 157 students who took 3-level pre-calculus in twelfth grade, averaged 24.6 on the math portion of the ACT, with 16.6% of these students scoring in the top 9% of the nation.

MINIMUM GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

To graduate, New Trier students must earn a minimum of 23 credits from courses taken during their high school years. Within these 23 credits, the following subject areas are required:

- English - 4 credits (4 years)
- Kinetic Wellness/Health - 4 credits (4 years)
- Mathematics - 3 credits (3 years)
- U.S. History - 1 credit (1 year)
- World History - 1 credit (1 year)
- Biology - 1 credit (1 year)
- Physical Science - 1 credit (1 year)
- Fine and/or Applied Arts - 1 credit (2 semesters)
- Consumer Education (1 semester)
- Civics - 0.5 credit (1 semester)

Students who successfully complete the first semester of any U.S. history course at New Trier also satisfy the U.S. and Illinois Constitution requirement.

HIGH SCHOOL COURSES COMPLETED BEFORE ENTERING GRADE NINE

Traditional high school courses taken in middle school (e.g., Algebra I, plane geometry, and modern and classical language courses) are NOT included on the transcripts. Students who begin high school in a second year or higher level course have completed the introductory level(s) successfully before entering ninth grade.

MODIFIED CURRICULUM (MC) GRADES

The Modified Curriculum (MC) designation indicates that the expectations and/or curriculum of a class were modified or altered in some way. Although the grade appears on the student's transcript, it is not calculated into his or her grade point average.



GRADE WEIGHTING AND REPORTING

Grade Weighting System

New Trier offers both weighted and unweighted grade point averages. The weighted average includes only major classes taken at New Trier and counts course grades, depending on level, according to the grade weight grid below. The unweighted average includes all courses, leveled and non-leveled, taken at New Trier. Students may choose to have their weighted or unweighted grade point average reported to colleges and scholarship agencies. The transcript clearly designates "weighted" or "unweighted." New Trier does not calculate or provide class rank.

SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY

The Integrated Global Studies School (IGSS) is a school-within-a-school designed for inquisitive, self-directed junior and senior students, who enthusiastically pursue an interdisciplinary, experiential curriculum. Interested students complete a written application and interview with current faculty members and peers. The rigorous, integrated course of study is designed with student input, making learning meaningful, relevant, and engaging. In this smaller school, students become active participants in the global community by applying their learning to complex contemporary issues, both local and global. IGSS students and faculty meet for three consecutive class periods every other day (255 minutes). Their work in our program integrates all three subjects and is informed by a Project Based Learning approach. Also, students are required to design and implement a passion project which brings them out into the community to help make a positive change in the world. Juniors and Seniors in IGSS receive credit for social studies, English, and fine art.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

IGSS students meet the same graduation requirements as other New Trier students. Classes taken in IGSS count towards New Trier graduation requirements.

SUBJECT-LEVEL GROUPING

Students in IGSS elect to complete their studies at honors (9) or high honors (4) level in each IGSS subject.

GRADE REPORTING

IGSS students receive extensive narrative evaluations representing their work in each IGSS class, which are an essential component of

their New Trier transcripts. In addition, students may request that their narrative evaluations be translated into letter grades. Students take control of their learning by applying for competencies, which are designed to highlight the core aspects of what students have accomplished, ultimately facilitating students' understanding of themselves as learners.
